Level Up: Dual Credit Pilot Program





Background

The main benefit to students revolves around providing opportunities to earn college credits while still in high school, giving them a head start on higher education and career paths <u>at no charge</u> to the student.

WVa §18B.14.4. Clarification

§18B.14.4. "Eligible student" means any secondary school student, including a homeschool, charter school, microschool, learning pod, or private school student, who meets minimum criteria established by the state school board and the commission or the council, as appropriate, for the purpose of enrolling in a dual credit course.

WVDE had concerns with the transfer of high school credits to a county high school system from school systems indicated.

I acknowledge that the courses listed in the approved pathway under the LEVEL UP Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) pertain to students enrolled in a homeschool, charter school, microschool, learning pod, or private school setting and an institution of higher education. I further understand that while the courses listed will count toward graduation at the high school level within the PK-12 setting specified in the MOU, they may or may not be accepted by a West Virginia county school system if the student should transfer back to a county school.

§13-19-8 Academic Support Services (Clarification)

Each university shall provide the following academic support services for students enrolled in the dual enrollment pilot program:

- Assign an academic advisor
- Provide each LEVEL UP student the name and contact information to their institutional advisor
- Advisor must meet, virtually or in person, each LEVEL UP student prior to the withdrawal date to provide the following (full list in Series 19):
 - Academic resources
 - Campus processes
 - College/University student handbook and code of conduct
 - Explanation of academic impact of dropping a course after the no-fault date
 - Comprehensive course syllabus

- Approved Pathway
- Dual credit funded covered by Level Up
- May be hired full time as a CTR, certified teacher of record, at 65% of the state aid formula their senior year (Residency 2 only)
- Governed by institutional policy
- MOU required for LEVEL UP

MICRO-CREDENTIAL – WV HEPC Series 59, Section 3.5

(approved July 2024)

"Micro-credential" is a **short, focused** credential designed to provide in-demand skills, knowledge, and experience.

Micro-credentials may be earned through a course or short series of courses that culminate in a "digital badge," which offers verified proof of competency and documentation of specific skills gained through the coursework, which is assessed against transparent and clearly defined criteria. [credit and not-for-credit]



WVa §18B-14-2. Transfer of credit for courses completed; WV HEPC Series 17

GENERAL STUDIES TRANSFER AGREEMENT

 This transfer agreement permits students to transfer up to 35 credit hours of general studies coursework between West Virginia institutions of higher education. These credits are not considered direct course equivalencies. Instead, the student receives credit for fulfilling general studies requirements according to the guidelines specified below

COURSE EQUIVALENCY TRANSFER AGREEMENT

 ...courses deemed "70% similar or the same" must transfer as equivalent courses among higher education institutions in the state. A statewide faculty committee has reviewed and vetted these courses for 70% alignment, and faculty at each public institution have approved the learning outcomes. These courses are considered equivalencies and must be accepted as prerequisites for specific major or program courses





What does this mean for our students?

- §18B-14-2. Transfer of credit for courses completed.
- (3) Providing to the student and sending institution clear and specific details regarding:
 - (A) Reasons that a receiving institution denies course credit transfer; and
 - (B) Additional information or actions, if any, necessary to permit the transfer;
- (4) Allowing a student to resubmit a course credit transfer request following denial
- Each institution shall establish an appeals process for the denial of transfer credit.


